



The Book Club continues to experiment with small-group, socially-distanced outdoor meetings as COVID-19 restrictions permit. For more information contact Sharon Grimshaw.


Here is our book selection for April

Tom Kennedy

I'm Irish-American. As you may know, the Irish are known for their blarney and in what follows there may be some untruths. See if you can guess which ones.

My family were hard core sailors (would never take a tow from a "stink-pot"). My grandfather built and repaired his own boats including wooden scows, Flying Dutchman and others in his boat house. I learned wood working there and made my own toys, mostly ships and guns and nearly cut off my finger on the power saw.

Later when I was around 9 my father bought a Sailfish, took me out twice and on the third outing pushed me off and said have fun. I taught myself to sail and spent my early summers sailing on Lake Mendota in Madison, often lying on my belly, steering with my feet, sheet in my teeth and occasionally falling asleep as I sailed. I'd take my friends out and we would run downwind, nose the boat into the next wave and see if we could get the boat to do fore/aft 360s. Never made it but we had fun.

I worked from the time I was 14, first cleaning planes and hangars at the local airport for money and rides. I worked all through college, doing food service, truck driving, construction, carpentry, electronics, printing, lifeguarding, repairing sail boats for the University of Wisconsin Hoofers Club or anything that made some money. While at Hoofers I had full run of their fleet, the high point of which was sailing their Star.



After 4 years I moved to Milwaukee to get my architecture degree. There I also got a commercial real estate brokers license, managed an apartment building and got a job teaching sailing for the University of Wisconsin Sailing Club (a few years before Jeanine Metts). I was elected commodore.

Milwaukee was where I learned deep water sailing and racing, crewing on a newly designed and dominant Soveral 30 the first year and a running the crew on a Standfast 40 the next. I also was working as a marine rigger and a crane operator at a local marina which is where I had a great adventure.

A young friend in the marina asked me if I wanted to join him on his family's boat sailing across Lake Michigan in the Queens Cup, from Milwaukee east to Muskegon. (Yes, this is the same race your editor was in) The next day I rushed from the marina to the Yacht Club, ran down the pier and jumped on as the boat pushed back. The boat was a Q-boat called Lively Lady. I had never seen a Q-boat but sensed immediately that I had stepped onto history. A little under 50 feet in length and 9-foot beam she was stately and solid, massive sails and felt like she wanted to run. The crew, were all about 3 years younger than my mature 22 years, few had ever sailed and most could swim.

As we approached the start it was a beautiful night, but there was lightning in the southeast. We started clean and everyone was excited ... and decided to get more excited, imbibing in lots of beer and other things... I held back being a little apprehensive of my fellow crewmember's capabilities and I knew nothing about the boat.

To make a long story short, the lightning came up fast, we got hit hard with a blast that blew off the hatch cover which smashed the compass and then the lights went out. With an inexperience crew, reefing was out of the question. After a short time the crew succumbed to the rising sea and alcohol, vomiting and diving below. Being the only somewhat sober one, I found myself on the tiller as she drove east on a starboard tack.

I had the time of my life. The rain stopped, the winds remained strong but manageable and the Lady was a magnificent sailor, strong, powerful and sliced through the waves with authority. I was ecstatic driving her all alone on deck, it was a spiritual experience.

But we didn't know where we were or where we were going. We had no lights, no power, no compass and no engine. After a couple of hours, the crew started to revolt and insist that we turn around and head back. I pointed out that if the winds had shifted, with a passing front, that going back would be sailing up Lake Michigan, about 400 miles. On the other had if we held our course, we'd hit Michigan in 50 or Indiana in 100. They went below again.

After a couple of hours, I saw another sailboat below us. I fell off and slide underneath our neighbor, who was quite startled as our giant ghost ship appeared 30 feet below. I yelled "which way to Michigan" and he pointed straight ahead, so we pushed on. As the sky later began to lighten, I could see the outline of the trees ahead and yelled for crew to come up so we could tack south, guessing on the right direction.

It was a beautiful morning, but then the gusts started to rise and as we healed over screams came from below. We were taking on water and there was fear of submerging, but we drove on, more delicately. If we sank at least we knew where shore was.

We did make it to Muskegon, one more tack up the channel, dropped sails and hard turned into a slip, almost stopping before crushing the dock. Later, it turned out that the crew had been doing work on the bilge pump and either did not reconnected the hose or wasn't clamped on tight. The starboard seacock was open so when we tacked onto port water started flowing in. If we had turned back during the mutiny, I might not be here to tell the tale and that beautiful Lady would be in 400 feet of very cold water ...

Lessons learned? 1) Never jump on an unknown boat with an unknown crew going across big water. 2) Never turn down the chance go get on a Q-boat.

OK, where are the untruths?

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
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


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
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
